The Division of Political Science offers a variety of opportunities to students who would like to build closer ties with others in political science, or who would like to learn more than what is taught in regular undergraduate courses. Here are a few of the opportunities we offer:

Four Options for Majoring in Political Science— The Political Science Division offers four different options for majoring in Political Science: the standard major, a Public Service track, an International Development track, and the Political Science Honors Program. The Public Service Major in Political Science is designed to provide a more directed course of study for students who are interested in a professional career in government and politics, and as a pathway for those who would eventually like to pursue a graduate degree in public service, public policy, or public administration. The major provides students with a strong foundation in American government, while instilling in them an understanding of public service. As part of the major, students are required to serve in an internship in a governmental, political, or other appropriate office. The International Development Major is designed to provide a more directed course of study for students who are interested in understanding the politics and governance surrounding international development. International development involves questions of global governance, international and development economics, foreign aid and humanitarian assistance, poverty reduction and human development, sustainable development, and international and intergenerational justice. The Honors Program is designed for our top students who seek out additional intellectual challenges, including research and writing an honors thesis during their senior year. It is distinct from the University Honors Program, but Political Science majors may be admitted to both programs. To be a member, a student must be a political science major and have earned a minimum overall grade point average of 3.2 and have a 3.5 GPA in political science course work. Students should apply for admission to the program during the winter or spring quarters of their junior year. Political Science Internship Program—the Political Science Internship Program allows students to earn up to 12 units of PS 404 credit as interns, be it working in the city or country government, assisting a non-profit organization, or participating actively in an election campaign. One of the most popular programs is the State Legislative Intern Program, which places students in the Oregon House and Senate. Public Law Program—the Political Science Division currently offers more than a dozen courses in U.S. and international public law, as well as internships in public law. The History Department, the Division of Administrative Justice, and the Division of Public Administration offer additional law-related courses. Taken together or in part, these courses provide an excellent grounding in law for those seeking employment after obtaining their undergraduate degree, and for those pursuing further legal or other academic studies. NEW Leadership Oregon—In partnership with Rutgers University, NEW Leadership Oregon is modeled after the award-winning leadership program designed by the renowned Center for American Women and Politics at Rutgers. The program is dedicated to inspiring, educating, and supporting the next generation of women political leaders. The main focus of the program is an intensive, six-day, summer residential leadership training program specifically designed to introduce Oregon's college women to opportunities for public leadership. Pi Sigma Alpha—outstanding juniors, seniors, and graduate students who have declared a major in political science are eligible to join Nu Pi, the Portland State University Chapter of Pi Sigma Alpha, the National Political Science Honor Society. The members of Nu Pi work closely with the political science student group to host activities of interest to political science students. Political Science Student Group—all political science majors and minors are eligible to join the Political Science Student Group. Political Science Graduate Program -- The Political Science Graduate Program offers graduate work leading to the Master of Arts and Master of Science degrees, as well as Master of Arts in Teaching and Master of Science in Teaching. Model EU—The Political Science Division participates regularly at the West Coast Model EU, offering PSU undergraduates an opportunity to interact with university students from across the west coast in a simulation of a European Council summit. Each university selects teams of outstanding students to play the role of representatives from selected EU member states. The teams then negotiate issues related to the European Union. It is a great opportunity to learn more about international politics and to meet with university students from across the region. Study Abroad—many political science majors build upon their college experience by enrolling in courses at foreign universities.
