



# • To aid in the identification of the remaining "Squaw" geographic names in Oregon and to facilitate gathering of required data for a name change submittal to the Oregon Geographic Names Board and the US Geographic Names Board


### BACKGROUND

- Recent push in the past decade to rename *Squaw* geographic features
- Controversial Proponents say *Squaw* is an offensive word, others say it's simply a word for *women* or *girl*.
- 2001 At the urging of Oregon tribes, Oregon legislature passed a resolution declaring that all remaining *Squaw* features in the state of Oregon be renamed
- 2008 Oregon has the most *Squaw* geographic features of any state in the union. 126 still exist in Oregon.



### TACKLING THE PROBLEM

- The Oregon Geographic Names Board voted to urge Oregon Tribes to propose replacement names
- Tribes often don't have the resources and staff to take on the process
- USGS Oregon Geospatial Liaison, an advisor to the OGNB, volunteered to help facilitate the process to anyone wanting assistance by providing research assistance and GIS services



# WHAT INFORMATION IS NEEDED TO SUBMIT A NAME CHANGE TO GNIS

- Proposed Name
- GNIS Feature ID number
- Type of feature, e.g., lake, mountain, creek, river, etc.
- Location information, state, county, Lat/Long DMS and DD, Township Range information, maps, etc.
- Reason for requesting change
- Any helpful supplemental information

# WHY IS IT TAKING SO LONG TO CHANGE THE OREGON *SQUAW* NAMES?


- Process is tedious
- Requires many man hours to collect necessary information for name change
- All interested parties must be contacted and given an opportunity to comment on the name
- Can take up to a year or longer to get final approval from Oregon Geographic Names Board to pass on to the US Board on Geographic Names

# DATABASE DESIGN: OREGON'S SQUAW GEOGRAPHIC PLACE NAMES








