The goal of the term paper is to give you the opportunity to learn more about an aspect of 19th-century France of **personal interest to you**. Your focus should be an area of social, economic, institutional or cultural life, or a significant event, for which there are <u>adequate resources</u> available in the PSU or other local libraries. For topics requiring specialized knowledge (e.g., musical knowledge for a project on French opera in the 19th century), you should choose it only if you already have that background.

Note: you must respect the chronological context of the course. That is, your topic should fall largely within the boundaries of 1789 to 1900.

Guidelines: your paper is to be <u>six</u> typed, double-spaced pages (1500 words). In addition, it will include a bibliography of your sources. You should follow **MLA format** for the paper. (A complete guide is available at http://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/resource/747/01/.) **If you want me to return your paper to you, you <u>must</u> attach a stamped self-addressed envelope to your paper at the time you submit it.**

Sources: you will need to gather your information from both **print** and **web-based** resources. You should <u>not</u> rely on a single source. Print resources will include book (or book chapters) and/or journal articles. (Note: you may find these materials on-line.)

How to start: find a general area of interest among the following suggestions (**or** propose another area you're interested in and get approval for it). Go to the library and speak to a reference librarian (2nd Floor) and ask how you can find resources on this topic and 19th-century France.

Agriculture in 19th-century France Arts, architecture (practice of these; an individual creator or work; an artistic movement) Business, trade union movement, etc. Children, family life Colonies: colonial society, trade Industry (development of the train system; steel industry; coal mining; textile mfg.) Medecine or public health Professions (e.g., medicine, law, teaching, banking, military service, engineering) Religion (the Church; status of Protestants or Jews in 19th cent. France) Schools and education Science: important French contributions, scientists Servants and domestic workers (training; role during Second Empire, in literary works) Significant individuals (e.g., Gustav Eiffel, Haussmann, Pasteur) Women in society (intellectual pursuits, writers/leaders, prostitution, education, work) Working class life, labor movement

Grading criteria: An A paper ...

has a beginning, middle, and an end (not too long a conclusion)
has a clear focus
is analytical (not a simple summary of your sources or a description of the subject)
is supported by evidence from your sources
incorporates historical material from the course
is clearly written (not too colloquial, not too academic)

•is formatted according to MLA guidelines

Submission:

•turn in a 1-paragraph description of proposed topic with a working title by **Thursday**, **May 23 or sooner**; communicate with me prior to that if you have questions or concerns about your topic

•turn in final printed version by **Friday**, **June 6**th, before 5:00 pm (NH491) (no e-mail submission)

•NOTE: papers incorporating <u>unattributed</u> material from other sources (e.g., material plagiarized from the Internet, etc.) or written by someone other than yourself <u>will</u> receive a grade of "0" (zero) and may be reported to the Office of Student Affairs.
