Aufgabe(n)

• Due Monday, 3 October: Write (in German) at least one page about "Meine Zukunft". Tell how you envision the next major part of your life, in its personal, educational, and career dimensions. It will help you to (re)read the personal statements we've read by people writing in German, and also what you've found in your "ich über mich" search. Here are some questions / topics to address:

- 1) Was sind Ihre Ziele im Leben / Beruf? (psychologisch? finanziell?)
- 2) Ihr weiteres Studium - nicht nur das Was, sonder Wie und Warum
- 3) Ihre zukünftigen Wohnverhältnisse - Wo? Mit wem? Wie? Warum
- 4) Freizeit und Privatleben - Was, und wie hängt das mit Ihren Studien- und Berufsplänen zusammen?

This writing sample will have several uses. It gives me a detailed "baseline" picture of your writing proficiency. It will go into your portfolio as part of documenting your German proficiency and your plans for the future, for example if you want to apply for a scholarship or job. At the end of the quarter, and maybe also in German 302, you'll repeat the activity to show how much progress you've made in your German and how your thoughts about the future have evolved.

• Upcoming: a listening assignment involving a relatively detailed biographical statement (Vico Torriani). Details to come Wednesday. I'm planning to alternate major assignments by starting writing assignments on Mondays, to be due a week later, so that you can ask questions during the Wednesday class (or by email), and then still have 5 days to work on them; listening assignments will come on Wednesdays (due following Wednesday).

Vorbereitung auf die nächste(n) Stunde(n)

from previous Monday and Wednesday:

- Begin searching, using (quoted) "ich über mich" and smart keywords, for a person in the German-speaking world who shares your educational, career, and even personal interests. This is preparation for assignments where you will translate that person's résumé and use its vocabulary to enrich your own résumé in German.
- Explore my conference presentation about SpeakEasy, so that you will better understand how SpeakEasy will fit into German 301-302.

New:

- Next week's topic is "Career Skills and Educational Background / Work Experience": Think systematically about the workplace / professional skills you have or want to have, both for your intended occupation, and what might be of use to the "SpeakEasy" part of our course. Start gathering the vocabulary to name and describe them; best way is to find real web pages about real people (try combining the skill with "über mich" or "Lebenslauf" or "Ausbildung")

JULIUS A year in Hawaii and loves sipping the homegrown Kona coffee when he's on the island.

Back at his home in Portland recently, he picked up a bag of Safeway's Select Kona Blend that tempts shoppers with the line, "Revel in the unmatched taste of savory beans from Hawaii's Big Island." But after turning the bag over and examining the fine print, Bastis was miffed.

"There was not one word about Kona on the back, instead it said 100 percent arabica coffee," he said. "Those kinds of things just bother me. I love Kona coffee, and I make sure I buy the real thing, but others might not be so careful."

It also bugged the Kona Coffee Farmers Association, which in July asked its members to boycott Safeway over the blend sold only on the mainland. Safeway, the cooperative wrote, priced its "Kona" coffee less than competitors' that actually feature their beans.

In Hawaii, blends must have at least 10 percent of Kona beans to wear the label. Safeway says its Kona blend has some

Job creation has been the talk of politicians, economists and cable-TV pundits in light of President Barack Obama's \$447 billion plan that he says will lower the nation's dismal 9.1 percent unemployment rate. And small businesses — not big corporations — are at the center of the discussion. This past week, Obama and Cabinet members hit the road to promote his proposal, which would slash payroll taxes next year, extend unemployment benefits, and create or save jobs for teachers, police, firefighters and construction workers.

The numbers

\$35,410

Average salary of an employee at a Multnomah County firm with five to nine workers

\$4,650

Average cost of health care coverage for the typical small-business employee in Portland; companies typically shoulder 80 percent of that figure.

Required documents

- **Employers must fill out an alphabet soup of federal forms** once they make a hire. A W-4 form allows employers to withhold federal income taxes, and an I-9 verifies employees' eligibility to work in the U.S.

- **Local, state and federal taxes:** With new positions come taxes for local, state and federal agencies. There are regional taxes, such as

TriMet's transit fee, and state-specific ones, such as the workers benefit assessment. All payroll taxes, such as unemployment insurance, depend on a company's total wages, which means employers are required to report new hires. There are services that specialize in taking care of the document maze for other companies.

- **Workers' compensation insurance:** Providers must be notified as they base workers' compensation insurance costs on a firm's total payroll, meaning the premium might fluctuate when another employee is added.

Extra benefits

Employers often offer workers **fringe benefits**, such as product discounts and TriMet passes. Every new employee adds to those costs.

Training

- **Every company has its own way of doing business**, and new workers

The Portland region added 10,200 jobs from August 2010 to August 2011, a new federal report shows, but the region's unemployment rate remains stuck at 9.1 percent.

As of August, 188,425 Oregonians were unemployed, putting the state jobless rate at 9.6 percent. State economists expect a slight improvement next year, to 8.7 percent.

But what does it cost a small-business owner to create one job in Oregon today?

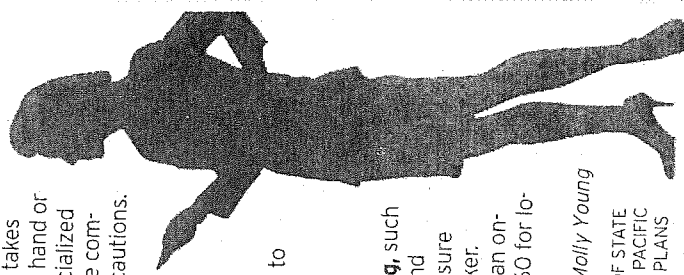
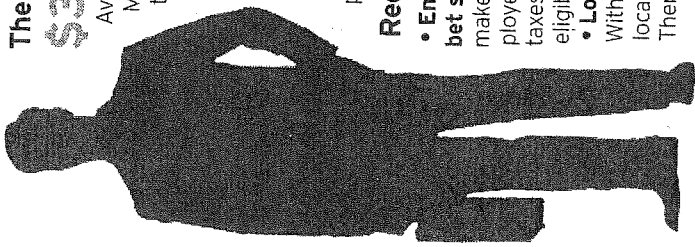
- **Recruiting time:** Small-business owners often underestimate the time it takes to recruit a new hire. The longer the process takes, the less time to spend on your bottom line.

Background checks

Pre-employment screening, such as drug tests and background checks, helps companies ensure they've found the right worker. The steps run from \$20 for an online background check to \$60 for local drug screens.

ted Jones' body, but high winds at the 9,000-foot level prevented the crew from reaching it.

Ground teams from Deschutes County Search and Rescue and Corvallis Mountain Rescue tried to reach Jones' body Sunday morning, but were forced to withdraw because of low visibility and blowing snow caused by 50- to 60-mph winds.

"We were able to ascertain his status from the helicopter late in the day, but then the weather started going south on us bad," Miller said.

Crews will wait for the weather to improve before attempting another recovery, he said.

That may take until midweek, according to the National Weather Service, which forecast snow and rain showers today on the mountain, with winds increasing to nearly 30 mph tonight and all day Tuesday.

Michael Ochsner, a veteran climber and member of Portland Mountain Rescue, has climbed the North Sister three times but was turned back over Labor Day weekend because of the deep snow from last winter.

Ochsner said the area where Jones fell is very rugged and requires a traverse across a difficult area known as the "bowling alley."

"If you slip on that, you're gone," he said.

In November 1995, two 19-year-old University of Oregon students from California, Frank Allard and Michael Casey, fell off the mountain in about the same place, Miller said.

"Myself and another Eugene Mountain Rescue member recovered Michael Casey's body in October 1996," Miller said. The next October, Eugene Mountain Rescue recovered Allard's remains.

"I remember this case like it was yesterday. The next day after both recoveries the weather came in and covered everything with a fresh blanket of pure white snow."

In climbing circles, according to summitpost.org, the North Sister is considered the most rugged of the Three Sisters, and the toughest to climb. It's alternately known as the "Ugly Sister," "Gnarly Northy" and "The Black Beast of the Cascades."

Teen finds a unique path to success with Forest Park app

Dylan Gattey turns an assignment for Lincoln High into a bonus for trail runners and hikers

The class was called "Theory of Knowledge" and the assignment was open-ended: Learn about something, apply the knowledge and show the class what you did.

Dylan Gattey and his Lincoln High School classmates jumped at the challenge. One student made a guitar. Another wrote a symphony. A third taught the class to work with stained glass.

Gattey, 17, wanted to create an iPhone application. Discussing the assignment with his family, he turned his attention to Forest Park, the 5,170-acre gem in the hills northwest of downtown Portland. The Gatteys live close to the park along Germantown Road, and he runs, hikes, bikes and walks dogs there.

Gattey's younger brother, Quinn, suggested an application to help identify the park's trees, bushes and flowers. His mother, Rebecca Gattey, who often runs and bikes in the park, had another idea.

The park's 70 miles of winding trails can be confusing, and accounting for them required 10 paper documents: nine maps and an index. Great stuff, but a bit bulky. "It's hard to run with a map," she said. What about a mobile version?

Gattey began his research, checking out books, reading websites and teaching himself how to build an application, step by step.

He approached the Forest Park Conservancy, which collaborates with Portland Parks & Recreation to maintain trails, improve habitat and other work. The conservancy often has people come in out of the blue with ideas and park propositions, but most fizzle. However, something about Gattey's idea
