Rule of thumb for 4/satisfactory: a) The word lists are specific to the topic, contain as many or more non-cognate terms as cognates, and can contribute several terms to the writing activities; b) The English message helps the reader get beyond the initial steps in exploring the topic; c) The German message is a cohesive paragraph (some macro-organization, some simple sentence-linking), with often accurate use of core language and some incorporation of special-topic language.

Germany is extremely rich in not only its own national Art History (*Kunstgeschichte*), but also extremely engaged in the study and research of Art History throughout all cultural times in the history of man. Anyone with a love for the German country and language would certainly be able to find a most rewarding career in the field of *Kunstgeschichte*.

There are fourteen major Universities in Deutschland which offer MA degrees in *Kunstgeschichte*, and many of these top Universities have their own *Institut für Kunstgeschichte und/oder Archäologie* as well as having direct connection with local museums. Most of these institutes also produce their own journals, which are always readily available online. It seems that since the country does have so much to offer in this area of study, that the main tough question would be "Which location do I choose to pursue?"

I shall now give you a good overview of my findings on what the different German cities have to offer. All references are listed on my reference page with all website links. First, I will begin with one of the most interesting and highly active Universität in the fields of *Kunstgeschichte und Archäologie*; Humboldt Universität, Berlin.

Humboldt Universität is a beautiful example of architectural art itself, in Germany's capitol city of Berlin.

Humboldt has its own *Institut für Kunst und Bildgeschichte* which publishes its own ejournal of *Kunsttexte* (art texts) and is also highly active in research in collaboration with The Egyptian Museum, which holds one of the largest *Antikensammlungen* (collection of antiquities) of ancient Egypt. This museum holds such items as the famous Nefertiti bust. Berlin is one of the most active cities in the archaeological research of Ancient Egypt which began with a recommendation to King Friedrich Wilhelm III by Alexander von Humboldt in the year 1828. From the earliest Prussian expeditions of Egypt to the current Naga expeditions of the Sudan, The Egyptian Museum of Berlin is one of the oldest sections of the Formal Royal Art Collection.

For my next Universität of focus I turn your attention to the *Goethe Universität Frankfurt Am Main*, which offers an excellent *Kritik* (Master of Arts) degree in Curatorial Studies. The website states "The focus of the Master's programme is academic reflection on curating and art criticism as an intellectual and aesthetic challenge with a practice-oriented perspective. The aim of the programme is to bestow skills that link an object-related approach to theoretical knowledge and expertise." This fine Universität also has its own *Kunstgeschichtliches Institut* which publishes a regular journal for research.

While several further prominent cities in Germany such as Bonn, Hamburg and München all hold very good Institutes for Kunstgeschichte und Archäologie, I found one of the most highly interesting places for such a career to be in Österreich (Austria). I find the *Kunsthistorisches Museum* in Wien, Österreich to be one of the most beautiful museums in existence and so rich with its collections consisting of everything from Egyptian and Near Eastern, Greek and Roman Antiquities, picture and decorative arts, a library and more! The museum itself is a fine art treasure; "The monumental structure, built at the behest of Emperor Franz Joseph I as part of his expansion of the city in 1858, was intended to both unite and appropriately represent the artistic treasures that had been collected by the

Habsburgs over the centuries." The Universität Wien also has a magnificent *Institut für Kunstgeschichte*! Wien also has a *Kunsthistorische Gesellschaft (Art History Society)* and a *Kommission für Kunstgeschichte* which is a research organization for the study of the visual arts of Austria. This Kommission produces a journal titled RIHA; Journal of the International Association of Research Institutes in the History of Art.
