Unit Timeframe:

One hour-long session, though could be expanded to either a several-week unit or an entire course

Main idea:

My idea for a 60-minute CBI activity uses the Theme Based Model of CBI¹. I would base the session around the theme of Politics and Government. The students would discover—through both outside research and then in-class activities—some of the main values and common hot topics in the target culture's government (in this case, France). Through a series of activities they would compare this system to their own, and culminate the class period in a final activity of a mock presidential election, where students would represent either a past political figure or their own creation of an "ideal candidate", defending their political stance. They would create and support this stance with both outside research on the culture and politics of the TC as well as previous in-class discussion. The class would then discuss these various candidates and their merits, and "elect" their ideal leader.

What would go into the "box": newspaper articles; government documents (information/documents on the EU & the French/American constitutions); a list of online resources for research; lesson plan for the activity, photos of current French/American presidents; campaign realia from France (posters, buttons, French voting ballots?)
