Basic Course Format

Each Thurs. : a biologist will present their research in a seminar talk.

Course goals, Learning Objectives:

Practice the art of explaining concepts we are familiar with and unfamiliar with.

Listen to scientific research talks.

Practice assessing scientific statements. Learn to differentiate between statements supported by strong evidence and those which are more speculative.

Look up and read peer-reviewed, primary literature to critically address questions arising from scientific talks.

Weekly Assignment: If you are an taking this course for credit, passing the course requires you to attend the seminars each week. Following each seminar, please submit one question you would like to ask the seminar speaker, based on what was presented during the seminar. The question each week can be submitted using the assignments or quizzes sections on the course's CANVAS site.

The point of the question is to ensure attendance... without actually taking attendance in front of the speaker, who thinks you are there simply because you wanted to hear about their research. (which is probably true, but...) To get credit, please be sure the question is about something the speaker discussed in their seminar.

Grading: Weekly assignments 100%
