<u>Canvas:</u> The syllabus and Workbook will be made available through the Canvas learning management system (canvas.pdx.edu) following PSU login.

Course Description: This class is ideally designed for students currently enrolled in an introductory geology class or who have taken such a course in the past. Enrollment is limited to 53 people. Our trip will investigate the geology of the Gorge across the main portion of the Cascades across different climate zones, from the Sandy River on the west, to the Rowena Crest Viewpoint on the east. Much of our route will be on the scenic Old Columbia River Highway, which was built a century ago as a showcase for the ages. During the pre-field trip class meeting students will be introduced to the geology of the Cascades and the Gorge. The Workbook must be turned in to the Instructor or TA no later than Friday **5 PM June 6** to be considered on time (it can be emailed as a PDF file that has been scanned), but most students should be able to turn it in before leaving the bus at the end of the field trip. Grades are P/NP only, determined based on attendance for the pre-trip meeting (30%), attendance for the field trip (30%), and completion of the workbook (40%). A minimum score of 71% is needed to pass the course; thus, attendance of both the pre-trip meeting and field trip as well as satisfactory completion of the workbook are required to pass. Transportation costs are included in the registration fee.

What to bring on the field trip: Casual clothes, including rain gear and walking shoes, are appropriate for this field trip. Bring water, lunch, a copy of the Workbook and possibly a digital camera, and a small notebook and writing implement. And a phone if so inclined.

When do we leave? 8:00 AM Saturday May 31. Meet near the corner of Broadway and Mill St, which is at the northeast corner of Cramer Hall, and look for a large bus. We have a long way to go and cannot afford to wait for late students, so get there with plenty of time in advance. Our scheduled return time is 6 PM at the same location.

<u>Communication:</u> email should be the primary means of contacting the Instructor or TA. This can be done with Canvas or through PSU gmail. As with all online communication, it is especially important to keep messages respectful.
